The following is an open letter from Rev. Shari Prestemon, Acting Associate General Minister and Co-Executive of Global Ministries United Church of Christ:

Dear partners in ministry,

I love Eugene Peterson's paraphrase of these verses in Matthew 5, and the clear commission they give to show up brightly in the world and be generous with our lives. That is the invitation extended in this year's One Great Hour of Sharing theme, Share the Light.

The scriptures tell us that huge crowds were gathering, drawn to Jesus by his teachings and the miracles of healing he performed. So, Jesus climbed a hill,

27 Years Ago . .

Even in death, ski race not to be missed

CABLE — Lynn Larson, pastor of Cable's Congregational United Church of Christ, had never been a pallbearer before Saturday.

But the tall and bearded 54-yearold made his pallbearing premiere skiing the American Birkebeiner, a 30-mile ski marathon that runs from Cable to Hayward, carrying Elmer Hassett's ashes.

Hassett, 70, died Jan. 15 after a bout with cancer.

He had hoped to live to race his 20th Birkie this year, and had registered early in his optimism.



Then, in December, when he knew he wouldn't live much longer, Hassett asked Larson, his pastor and friend, to take his ashes on the trail and see that he earned his Birchleggings Club bib anyway. Birchleggings recognize skiers who've skied at least 20 Birkies.

"Elmer told me, 'You be the arms and the legs and take me across my 20th,' " Larson said with tears in his eyes after the race. "I said I'd be honored."

Larson kept his promise, wearing a 13¹/₂-pound backpack on the course with Hassett's ashes.

Soon the ashes will be scattered on the trail and a plaque will be posted in Hassett's honor.

Meanwhile, his story came to symbolize the spirit of the race for many skiers.

Post Script: In 2006, Pastor Lynn achieved Birchlegger status himself when he skied his 20th Birkie.


