Thoughts from Pastor Phil



The Affirmation of Humanity by Rev. Phil Milam

"The burden of being black and the burden of being white is so heavy that it is rare in our society to experience oneself as a human being. It may be, then, that the most revolutionary thing one can do is to affirm one's humanity." Howard Thurman

Affirming one's humanity, affirming one another's humanity. Isn't that what Jesus taught over and over again? Whether it was the despised Samaritan, a suffering leper, or a woman who longed to be restored, Jesus affirmed their humanity. Their nationality, their religion, or the color of their skin didn't matter to him; he had compassion for them in their suffering, and he did what he could to help them.

Across our nation today, we're experiencing the opposite of what Jesus taught. Instead of affirming one another's humanity, our government is devaluing humanity. In deference to Thurman's assertion, being brown carries an additional burden of distrust and rejection in today's America. The current policy of ICE is to stop individuals who "look like they might be undocumented." Whether a citizen or non-citizen, having brown skin constitutes a reason for suspicion. And when undocumented individuals are detained, they're sent to detention centers and holding facilities to suffer under deplorable conditions. Camps that conjure up images of the Japanese internment camps of the 1940s.

And make no mistake, this is not only un-American, but also un-Christian. Jesus, when asked which of the commandments was most important, didn't hesitate to answer. "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your being, and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: You must love your neighbor as you love yourself. (Matt. 22:37-39) The treatment of our Latinx neighbors by our government is anything but loving.

So, what can we do about it?

Well, Dietrich Bonhoeffer put it quite plainly: "The church has an unconditional obligation to the victims of any ordering of society, even if they do not belong to the Christian community. The church must not simply bandage the victims under the wheel but jam the spoke in the wheel itself." Bonhoeffer goes on to say, "Silence in the face of evil is itself evil: God will not hold us guiltless. Not to speak is to speak. Not to act is to act."

Theologian Cameron Tremble, reflecting on Bonhoeffer's statement, offers the following: "This is that moment," she writes. "When the state builds camps, people of good faith must build refuge. When the state funds fear, the people must fund courage. When the state demands silence, the Spirit demands witness. None of us is exempt from this calling.

Let us not say later that we didn't know. We do.

Let us not say later that we didn't see it coming. We did.

Let us not say later that we were waiting for a sign. This is the sign. And even now—especially now—we are not without hope. Hope is not wishful thinking.

It is the discipline of refusing to surrender to despair.

It is the practice of solidarity, courage, and sacred imagination. Detention camps may be built with concrete and steel

(or even tents in a swamp) But the bonds of human dignity run deeper. Let us not look away. Let us not remain polite when clarity is required.

Let us not wait for permission to do what we already know is right."

This is the challenge and the calling of our time
