Little Free Food Pantry

UCC served the food shelf in August. We served 27 families, which worked out to be 56 people. Everyone who volunteered did a great job. An official from TEFAP, The Emergency Food Assistance Program of Wisconsin visited the food shelf recently. TEFAP is one of the government programs that provides some of the food that the Cable Area Food Shelf gets each month. The official feels optimistic that the program will continue, in spite of government cut backs. He suggested that things could be even better in the fall, providing more food choices than we have right now.

If you are grocery shopping the Little Free Food Pantry is in need of spaghetti sauce/noodles, canned fruit, tuna, canned chicken. Extra items that always go well are ketchup, mustard, salad dressing, spices, and coffee. Thank You!

Thoughts from Pastor Phil



The Expansive Gift of Generosity: Giving Ourselves and Our Resources by Rev. Phil Milam

Introduction

As Summer begins to fade into the brilliance of Autumn, the season of giving thanks, we find ourselves once again pondering the deep and transformative nature of generosity. Often, our understanding of giving is confined to the tangible: dollars in the offering plate, canned goods for the food pantry, volunteer hours for a worthy cause. While these gifts are vital and appreciated, our faith tradition invites us to broaden our vision. What does it mean to be generous, not only with our possessions, but with our very selves? How does our faith call us into a life where giving is not just something we do, but a way of being?

The Roots of Generosity in Scripture

The sacred stories we indwell as people of faith are saturated with invitations to give, but the heart of giving is always relational. In Acts 2, we read about those in the early church sharing all they had, breaking bread together, supporting one another "as any had need." This was not mere charity; it was an embodiment of kinship and radical hospitality. When Jesus speaks of giving, he does not limit his call to material resources. Instead, he offers himself, his time, his attention, his compassion, freely and abundantly. Consider the parable of the Good Samaritan. The Samaritan does not only provide for the wounded man's immediate needs; he also gives his presence, his empathy, and his ongoing care. Or reflect on the widow's mite: her small offering is celebrated not for its monetary value, but because she "gave all she had." Generosity, in God's economy, is measured not by how much we give, but by the depth of our willingness to share ourselves, to risk vulnerability, and to enter into the joys and sorrows of others.

Giving of Ourselves: The Gift of Presence

In our fast-paced, transactional world, presence can be the rarest and most precious gift. Our faith calls us to practice generosity not only with our resources, but with our attention, our compassion, our time, and our talents. This kind of giving is not limited by the size of our bank account or the hours in our day. Rather, it asks us to show up fully, authentically, and consistently.

When we listen deeply to a friend in need, when we stand alongside someone facing injustice, when we celebrate another's joy or grieve their sorrow, we offer something more profound than money: we offer ourselves. Giving of ourselves means seeing the sacredness in every encounter, refusing to objectify or overlook, and being willing to be changed by relationship.

And I know, It's not always easy. To be generous with our presence means risking disappointment, fatigue, or even heartbreak. Yet, it's precisely in these moments of honest connection that we become conduits of God's grace. As Henri Nouwen writes, "When we honestly ask ourselves which person in our lives means the most to us, we often find that it is those who...were simply there for us."

Our Resources: Tools for Justice and Compassion

The call to generosity still includes our resources. Our tradition recognizes that our wealth, however modest, can be leveraged for justice, healing, and transformation. Yet, the key is intention. When we give, we're not only meeting a need; we're declaring that the world's abundance is meant to be shared, that every person deserves dignity, has value, and that our possessions are not barriers but bridges. This approach to giving asks us to move beyond charity into solidarity. We do not give out of pity or obligation, but out of recognition that we are intricately connected, that another's flourishing enhances our own. Our financial gifts can fuel ministries of advocacy, support those at the margins, and dismantle systems of oppression. When we share what we have, whether it's money, food, skills, or space, we participate in the ongoing work of co-creating God's Realm on earth.

Practices of Generosity: Embodying the Spirit

How do we cultivate generosity as a spiritual discipline? First, we begin with gratitude. Every act of giving flows from the deep awareness that all we have, life, breath, time, resources, are a gift. Gratitude opens our hearts and frees us from the grip of fear and scarcity. As we give thanks, we become more attuned to opportunities for generosity in everyday life. Second, we seek community. Generosity flourishes in relationship. When we commit to sharing our lives with others, to showing up, to listening, to laughing

and lamenting together, we create spaces where generosity becomes contagious. Our church is a living laboratory for these practices, inviting us to risk, to succeed or fail, and to try again. And finally, we remember that generosity is transformative. When we give of ourselves and our resources, we are changed. Our hearts expand, our vision clears, and our souls become attuned to the rhythms of grace.

A Generous Vision for the Future

So, as we look toward the future as a congregation, may continue to ask: How can we be generous? Not just with our wealth, but with our time, our talents, our presence, and our hearts? How can we create a church where every person feels seen, heard, and valued, not just as a recipient, but as a giver? And may continue to be a community where generosity overflows, where we invest in each other's well-being, where we challenge injustice, where we celebrate difference, and where we honor the sacredness of every person, every being, every life.


This month, I invite you to consider where you might be called to give.
